P&HCC Awarded \$20,000 grant to create Scholarships

Howmet Aerospace Foundation announced it is awarding the Patrick & Henry Community College Foundation [P&HCC] with \$20,000 to establish several scholarships for students in Industrial Electronics Technology (IET) programs.

With the new scholarship, students in these programs could receive \$1,000 to cover classes as early as January 2021 and, if they maintain eligibility, could receive another \$1,000 in the fall. Depending on the number of students who are eligible to receive funding both semesters, the college anticipates awarding the scholarship to between 10 and 20 students.

“We are thrilled to receive this award from Howmet,” says P&HCC’s Vice President of Workforce Economic and Community Development, Rhonda Hodges. “For our community, this scholarship could have a two-fold positive impact. Our IET programs lead to careers that are in high demand in our community. That means that when the students who get this scholarship graduate, they’ll likely be able to fill much-needed positions in local companies like Howmet. So, this really could be beneficial for both our local employers and the graduates they hire.”

Registration for spring 2021 classes is going on right now and classes begin January 7 so students interested in the scholarship should register as soon as possible. To register for classes, students can contact advising@patrickhenry.edu to inquire about the scholarship, students should contact lpulliam@patrickhenry.edu. The funds will be distributed on a first-come-first-serve basis with a priority given to under-represented demographics.

“We recognize the important role that Patrick & Henry Community College plays in training our community’s future workforce,” said Jeremy Belloir, plant manager, Howmet Aerospace Martinsville Operations. “This is why we are supporting the college with this grant from the Howmet Aerospace Foundation. We as a local business must collaborate with our STEM education institutions to create the development opportunities that are so critical to the success of our entire community.”

Scholarship Established to Honor Maureen Norman

When Maureen Norman passed away, many at Patrick & Henry Community College lost a friend and former colleague. For more than two decades, Maureen Norman was a beloved instructor, advisor, and friend to many at Patrick & Henry Community College. To honor her life, her work, and her passion for changing lives through education, the Norman family has established the Maureen Quarles Thompson Norman Memorial Scholarship Fund with a donation of \$10,000.

Norman's husband, Jim Norman, told the college "Maureen was intent on connecting with all of her students and having them connect with her. She would always say to her students, 'are you with me?' This was her way of knowing if she was leaving

someone behind. This scholarship is one way that we can ensure that she will always be with the students at P&HCC. Our hope is that her students and the community at large will continue to support her legacy through this scholarship."

Two P&HCC Students Swim with Sharks for Science

In July 2020, two students of Patrick & Henry Community College made a trip to the Bahamas. They did not go for the typical leisurely vacation though. This was a research expedition. They swam with sharks, cleaned beaches, and conducted field research with experienced marine scientists and professors from across the country.

Last year, while watching Discovery Channel's iconic annual "Shark Week" – a week of TV programming dedicated to sharks – P&HCC's Professor of Biology Jason Worley discovered an opportunity for his students that would be unlike any he has ever offered. From Shark Week, Worley heard about an organization called Saving the Blue – which, according to the organization's website aims "to inspire, influence, and coach a generation of ocean advocates through hands on, in-field research activities."

Worley found that this organization allows scientists and students from around the country to join notable marine biologists on research expeditions. These expeditions involve catching and tagging sharks and observing the sharks in their natural habitat. To be part of such an expedition would be an eye-catching line on a student's resume and a great opportunity to get a taste of a future career. When Worley told his students about the opportunity, Wylie Martin and Marco Diaz jumped at the chance. Both students are passionate for science and nature with aspirations to become scientists. Worley has offered both Diaz and Martin opportunities for hands-on field research experience before – but nothing quite like this.

Over their time at P&HCC, Martin and Diaz have joined Worley on expeditions to catalog local reptiles and amphibians. Through these expeditions, both students have had the opportunity to publish their findings in field journals– something most college students may not get the opportunity to do until their senior level or masters level courses.

However, trekking through Virginia's woods and handling salamanders and toads is nothing like the research they are about to embark on. They do not know yet exactly what research they'll be conducting when they get down there, but they do know two things. First, the first day will involve extensive training on how to properly handle sharks in their natural environments. Second, they will be working with Shark Week's notorious shark expert Dr. Tristan Guttridge. Diaz says that he has been following Guttridge's work –

Growing up in Bassett in the 90s, Jonathan Salmons and his friends raced pretty much everything they had. Bikes, go-karts, you name it.

When he wasn't racing his friends on the streets, he was at the dirt track at Oak Level Raceway. One of his friend's cousins raced a car there, and Salmons would help him work on the car and watch the races.

When it came time for Salmons to graduate from Bassett High School in 2001, he knew he wanted to go to college and he knew he wanted to do something mechanical. At the time, Patrick & Henry Community College had just started their motorsports program.

Now, 20 years after high school, Salmons is still using what he learned at those Oak Level races and from P&HCC to help drivers on NASCAR's highest level. Since 2014, Salmons has been working as an engine tuner with the No. 17 car of Roush Fenway Racing, now driven by Chris Buescher.

watching along as Guttridge posts updates on his social media of a hammer head shark that he has tagged. "I am really excited [to work with Guttridge] considering he is an explorer for National Geographic," says Diaz. "I've seen what he's done, and I am really excited to work alongside of someone like that."

Although they probably won't be handling hammer heads with Guttridge, the hodgepodge team of students, professors, and scientists that Diaz and Martin are joining will likely be placing GPS trackers on a few smaller sharks. Their focus on this trip will not be entirely on sharks though; they're also planning to observe stingrays, sea turtles, and more.

The aim of their research will be to better understand how these marine ecosystems work and how humans can help conserve and preserve the animals' habitats. For both Martin and Diaz, helping the animals and the ecosystem will be one of the biggest highlights of the trip.

"It will be overwhelming and exciting to do something that most people don't get to do [...] You get to help a species thrive. You're a helping hand to the animal world. The marine life wouldn't be what it is today without the help of researchers – the people that are willing to take risks for a better world," says Martin.

For Martin, taking a risk – that is swimming alongside a natural predator – will also be a chance for him to prove to himself that he has what it takes to chase his dreams. "Getting over the fear of being in the water with a shark and actually working side by side with a marine biologist – it'll give me motivation to push towards my goals for school and for working with natural predators in the

future. [...] I've always wondered 'would I share the water with a shark?' In a way, this is checking something off my bucket list."

The risk of swimming with sharks has a different appeal to Diaz. As someone who is passionate about animals, Diaz is concerned that people misunderstand sharks and their nature. He hopes that by working with sharks and learning to handle them safely, he can be an advocate for these sometimes-misunderstood creatures.

"I just want to go and experience so I can help dismantle stereotypes. Getting to educate people about things like this [...] means so much to me."

Like Martin, Diaz believes this experience will give him a head start for his future as he hopes to get a job as a wildlife/conservation biologist.

Ultimately, preparing his students to meet their futures goals is exactly what Jason Worley was hoping this experience would provide.

"Diaz and Martin are both great students and this will be a perfect opportunity for them to really see what field research is like with one of the world's top scientists in his field," says Worley.

Dr. Angeline Godwin Retired after Nine Years as President of P&HCC

During President Godwin's nine-year tenure at P&HCC, the college has continually grown and prospered –even through challenges. Over the years, the college's footprint has grown significantly with the addition of the Dalton IDEA Center in uptown Martinsville; the Manufacturing, Engineering, and Technology Complex in the Patriot Center; as well as two different training facilities in Patrick County.

Under her leadership, the college received several national distinctions including the Community Colleges of Appalachia's Workforce Development Award in 2014 and Achieving the Dream's Leah Meyer Austin Award in 2015. P&HCC was recognized as an NC3 Leader School in 2018 and then in 2020 became the first institution in the nation to be named an NC3 Festo Center of Excellence in Industry 4.0 Advanced Manufacturing.

P&HCC also received several competitive national and regional grants that enabled the college to launch many unique programs. One example would be grants from the National Science Foundation and the American Association of Community Colleges that

together enabled P&HCC

to establish the IDEA Academy. Another grant from the Verizon Foundation established the Verizon Innovative Learning Camp. With a \$3.1 million grant from Harvest Foundation, P&HCC established the SEED program which has enabled hundreds of students to attend P&HCC for free.

Godwin had a significant influence on the growth of the college's athletic program as well. Over the last nine years, P&HCC has added a number of new sports and served more than 1200 student-athletes including numerous athletes from a variety of different countries. P&HCC's Athletic Director Brian Henderson says:

"Dr. Godwin has always said 'but for P&HCC, many student-athletes would not have the opportunity to pursue a degree while playing a sport they love.' In so many ways, we're able to provide this opportunity because of her leadership. Without Dr. Godwin, I do not know where P&HCC Athletics would be. ...In fact, I'm not certain where I would be. One thing that I am certain of is that I'm honored to have worked for, learned from, and built a PHAMILY alongside Dr. Angeline Godwin."

Godwin's positive impact stretches beyond the college and into the surrounding community as well. The communities served by P&HCC have benefitted tremendously from her vast knowledge and experience in economic and community development."

Godwin has had an active role in the Economic Development Corporation and with the Chamber of Commerce's Start-Up and Grow Martinsville Programs. She regularly welcomes potential business prospects for tours of the college campus and is active in discussing training opportunities that could further economic development opportunities for local and prospective businesses.

"I have heard Dr. Godwin say many times that the legacy of a leader is, in reality, the things that are still flourishing a decade after the leader departs," says Greg Hodges P&HCC's Vice President of Academic & Student Success Services. Even after Godwin's retirement, members of Martinsville's Start-Up and Grow Programs will likely continue to benefit from the entrepreneurial guidance she offered them. Likewise, P&HCC's students will likely continue benefitting from the work Godwin accomplished on the Phi Theta Kappa National Honors Society Presidential Advisory Board. The many students and employees who participated in the Presidential Leadership Programs which she established will continue to benefit from the advice she provided in those meetings.

"Throughout my career, I've worked closely with many community college presidents and Angeline Godwin is among the very best. For nearly a decade now, her leadership has advanced not just the college, but also the broader community it serves. Angeline is a difference-maker, and she will be missed. That said, I wish her all the best in a well-earned retirement," said Glenn DuBois, chancellor of Virginia's Community Colleges.

After retiring, Godwin plans to move back to her family home in Mississippi where she resided before coming to P&HCC. With her new-found free time, she plans to enjoy her favorite hobbies: songwriting, painting, and reading. P&HCC named “School on the Rise” by National Coalition of Certification Centers

Through the NC3 network of certification centers, P&HCC offers industry-recognized credentials that have been vetted by business and industry leaders. With an NC3 credential, students can know that their education meets national skills standards and prepares them for current jobs in the industry.

P&HCC has been a member of NC3 since August 2018. Shortly after joining the coalition, NC3 recognized P&HCC's rapid success by naming the college an NC3 Leadership School in October 2018. Since that time, P&HCC's students have earned well over 1,000 NC3 credentials. These credentials prepared students to launch their careers in Mechatronics, Industry 4.0, and Information Technology—fields that are in increasing demand in the region.

Another NC3 credential offered at P&HCC is a workforce readiness class designed by the Mike Rowe WORKS Foundation. This credential—a little different from the rest—uses Mike Rowe's platform from the popular TV show 'Dirty Jobs' to encourage students to have a good work ethic.
